

THE FAR SIDE OF THE TALMUD IS CLOSER THAN YOU THINK

The Talmud is the repository for halacha, assembled by our Sages. The Talmud also contains the wisdom of our Sages on all matters of Jewish thought and outlook, keen insights into human nature, and advice on how to live our lives. These areas, known as aggada, are a veritable fountain of wisdom, but they

are often terse and enigmatic, full of hyperbole and riddles. Understanding the true intent of these passages is no small feat, but the knowledge and wisdom hiding beneath the surface is ample reason to make the effort.

This past spring, Rabbi Moshe Heyman delivered a series of classes, entitled The Far Side of the Talmud, for women at the Southeast Kollel Torah center aimed at presenting the depth and breadth of this section of Torah. Discussing such topics as Dreams, Nightmares, and Visions: When to Worry, When to Laugh and Rabbi Akiva, the Eternal Optimist: G-d's Goodness in Dark Times, his erudition in this area came to the fore as he presented participants with the beauty and grandeur of aggada.

Rabbi Heyman feels that the class opened a new window into appreciating the wisdom of our Sages. "Teaching and learning the depths of aggada, which for many just seems like stories, has strengthened the notion of how much our Talmudic Sages had to offer about life," he says.


"He (Rabbi Heyman) took very difficult portions and translated them

t the Denver Community Kollel, the "Because idea Torah is for every Jew" isn't just a pat statement;

an amazing chulent!"

Late Monday nights find Rabbi Stern around a bonfire for a class that is supposed to be about the parsha, but, says Rabbi Stern, "The discussion usually ends up moving to some controversial issue, and we end up in a heated discussion that can last for hours!"

Rabbi Stern also gives a class on Wednesday night on the East Side. This class, too, was begun by Rabbi Amsel, but, says Andy

is axiomatic to the Kollel's mission. And Kollel Scholar Rabbi Akiva Stern can attest to that.

"Each week I have the unique opportunity to learn with wildly disparate study groups!" he exclaims. "I study with teens and seniors. People who have studied in yeshiva and people who have never had the chance to learn Torah previously."

Rabbi Stern and his wife, Chani, have been part of the Kollel for nearly two years. They, along with their two daughters, Mari, 3 and Raizy, 1 ½, live on Denver's West Side, where they have become an integral part of the community.

Chani Stern is involved in numerous Kollel projects; she is a Partners-in-Torah participant, cooks and bakes for, and helps coordinate, Kollel events, and organizes Kollel Women's Division get-togethers.

"Since we joined the Kollel two years ago, I've seen tremendous growth within my family," says Chani. "Our connection to this amazing organization has broadened our horizons and has made an ever-lasting impression upon us. I'm thankful for the amazing Kollel family that adopted us here in Denver! I look forward to many more growth-full years in this wonderful community."

Rabbi Stern's ability to connect to a wide range of people is apparent from the numerous classes he gives on a weekly basis. One class, which he took over from Rabbi Yehuda Amsel upon the latter's departure from Denver several years ago, is geared for men over the age of sixty, and attracts as many as fifteen people on Mondays. Another class he delivers on Thursday evenings includes a chulent, and caters to men in their twenties, including Aaron Litzman.

"One of Rabbi Stern's many talents is that he knows how to relate to everyone is the class, which makes it very easy to talk to him about whatever the issue is," says Aaron. "He also makes the weekly parsha relevant to each class participant, no matter what his background is. INAUGURAL EVENT CELEBRATES OPENING OF SOUTHEAST KOLLEL TORAH CENTER

When the Denver Community Kollel was established over sixteen years ago, its bais medrash (study hall) was located on Denver's West Side. In Southeast Denver, Rabbi Yaakov Meyer was building a community as he reached out to Jews in Denver. At that time, Rabbi Meyer invited the Kollel to hold a weekly Wednesday night Torah study session in the Southeast.

Fast forward to 2014. Rabbi Meyer is now the Rabbi of Aish Denver, an Orthodox synagogue that has hundreds of members. And, as Aish has grown, the Kollel's involvement has grown, as well. There is now a learning session every night of the workweek in Aish Denver to go along with the learning sessions at the West Side Bais Medrash. Three Kollel families and several Kollel alumni make their homes in Southeast Denver, and the Kollel offers numerous classes to both men and women on a weekly basis in the Southeast community.

Approximately one year ago, Rabbi Meyer offered the Kollel the opportunity to rent its own bais medrash in the Aish Denver building, and the Kollel accepted the offer. Rabbi Moshe Heyman, the Kollel's Director of Programming and one of the original two Kollel families who moved to the Southeast over seven years ago, was a driving force behind this latest milestone. "Having watched this community develop, it is very gratifying to have reached this point," he says. "We look forward to further growth of the Kollel and the community here."

On June 15th, 2014, Rabbi Aryeh Malkiel Kotler, Dean of Beth Medrash Govoha of Lakewood, NJ, the largest yeshiva in the United States, visited Denver to mark the Kollel's inaugural event of its new Southeast Kollel Torah Center.

Rabbi Kotler's visit began with over one hundred men, women and children gathering at Denver International Airport to greet Rabbi Kotler. Following dancing, Rabbi Kotler personally greeted those who had come to welcome him to Denver.

The inaugural event took place on Sunday afternoon at

Aish Denver, and featured an address by Rabbi Kotler. Before introducing Rabbi Kotler, Kollel Dean Rabbi Shachne Sommers discussed the importance of the new Kollel Torah Center.

Rabbi Sommers noted that although the Kollel has been involved for many years with the Southeast community, having

its own place marks a new level in its development.

"Sixteen years ago, Rabbi Yaakov Meyer invited the Kollel to come to Southeast Denver to create a bais medrash," said Rabbi Sommers. "With the development of the community, we have reached... a new level of stability and permanence."

In his address, Rabbi Kotler discussed that a kollel brings

more than just Torah study to the community; it also brings the pleasure of a Torah lifestyle.

"That's what a kollel is. Bringing the presence of Torah... in a way that brings a pleasantness, a sweetness... it brings life, it brings joy."

In addition to the address at the inaugural event, Rabbi Kotler delivered a talk for women and a Talmudic lecture for men at the event. After delivering several talks on Denver's West Side, Rabbi Kotler returned to Lakewood, NJ late Sunday night.

"Listening to Rav Kotler, I felt an awe at his presence," said Joyce Litzman. "His depth and sincerity made an impression."

Chaya Sara Singer gained a higher appreciation of what it means to have a kollel in the community.

"He gave me a greater understanding of a kollel's influence on a community as it creates an establishment of Torah."

The Kollel continued its successful, long-running Legal Learning Program during the spring and summer. The program, which features shacharis, breakfast and learning, gives Jews throughout Denver the opportunity to start their day off on the right foot with Torah study.

May 26th, Memorial Day, was shortly before Shavuos, when dairy delights abound; the topic under discussion was thus The Waiting List: The Laws of Waiting between Milk and Meat. On July 4th, the learning focused on The Will of the Masses: The Role of Democracy in Judaism.

Participants had a choice of three locations in Denver, as learning took place at the Kollel's West Side Bais Medrash, at the Southeast Kollel Torah Center, and at EDOS on the East Side. "We are delighted that we have the resources and ability








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
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The Denver Community Kollel has two batei medrash (study halls), the Kollel West Side Bais Medrash and the Southeast Kollel Torah Center.
