Kollel to Celebrate 20 Years of Eternity on March 6th

Leternity can mean a lot of different things to a lot of different people. For a child, the final days of school before vacation seem like an eternity. An intense moment can stretch for eternity. Judaism, though, has a very different view of eternity.

"Hashem is eternal," explains Kollel Dean Rabbi Shachne Sommers. "The Torah, His wisdom that He has shared with us, is eternal. And we not only touch eternity, but share in and incorporate that eternity into ourselves when we conduct our lives in a way that includes Hashem and his Torah."

"Twenty years of bringing Torah to Denver Jewry has tapped into eternity," says Kollel Dean Rabbi Aron Yehuda Schwab. "People who were born after our arrival in Denver are getting married and building families. A generation of children who grew up in an environment of Torah that the Kollel had a role in creating and nurturing are now passing their values to their children. The mesorah continues, it moves toward

the future. The eternity of Torah is inextricably linked with the eternity of the Jewish People."



The Kollel will celebrate 20 years of Torah eternity on March 6, 2018 at 6:30 pm with a groundbreaking event for its 3-story Kollel Torah Center. (See page 3 for more on the Groundbreaking Event.) The event will take place

in the 20th Anniversary Celebration Pavilion at 5080 W. 14th Ave., site of the future Kollel Torah Center. "Our Sages teach us that synagogues and batei medrash (study halls) will, with the advent of the Messianic Era, relocate to the Land of Israel along with the Jews as they return from the Diaspora," says Rabbi Sommers. "This building, then, is certainly an appropriate expression of the eternity of Torah and the Jewish People. As we celebrate 20 years, we look back and express our profound appreciation Hashem for the opportunity to have a part in that eternity."

"The consistency that the Kollel represents in study, in-depth Talmud classes, seminars, holiday programming, customized programming for both groups and individuals,

and, of course, their friendship, has enriched my life and my family's life," says Mike Weiss, CEO of LCM Property Management. "Through the leadership and scholarship of the Roshei Kollel (Kollel Deans) and the Kollel Scholars, the Jewish community has access to our entire Jewish heritage. 
The Youth Center will include a children's library, exercise center, youth lounge, and spacious cafeteria, among other features and attractions.

The term "groundbreaking," apart from referring to "breaking ground," has come to mean something new, exciting and revolutionary.


The Kollel Torah Center groundbreaking, apart from referring to "breaking ground," also means something new, exciting and revolutionary.

Jeff Weiskopf, a Monsey, NY resident, is Chairman and Chief Executive Officer at White Eagle Property Group, LLC, and serves on the Board of Governors of Beth Medrash Govoha, the largest yeshiva in North America. He has been involved in numerous successful Torah building campaigns across the country. Jeff is deeply committed to and invested in the Kollel's current campaign.

"This groundbreaking marks the beginning of a new era in the building of Torah in Denver," says Jeff. "As we break ground, as this building begins to go up, the excitement and momentum for Denver's great Torah future will build, as well."

and Los Angeles," says Kollel Director Rabbi Moshe Heyman. "From a spacious *bais medrash* (study hall) and learning lounge to welcoming classrooms and a dynamic youth center, as well as many other features and amenities, the Torah Center will be a beacon for Jews throughout Denver to gather and connect with each other and their traditions."

The event will be graced with the presence of out-of-town Kollel alumni who are returning to Denver to be on hand and take part in this momentous occasion, including Rabbi Mordechai Mandel, who relocated to Cleveland in 2013. Rabbi Mandel currently serves as a congregational rabbi and Torah teacher in a local Jewish day school. "Who would have thought, back in 2013, that we'd be celebrating a groundbreaking for such a center of Torah and *yiddishkeii*?" says Rabbi Mandel. "It is thrilling to see the Kollel growing and thriving."

The groundbreaking will feature an address from Rabbi Yaakov Meyer, founder and leader of the Aish Denver community. "Rabbi Meyer has been a true visionary in Denver for decades," says Rabbi

Heyman. "Our joint efforts in building a Torah community have enabled us to spread Torah to many parts of the greater Denver area."

t has defined a generation. Twenty years ago, the Denver Community Kollel opened its doors. Kollel scholars and their families would live in the community. They would meet, interact, bond with Jews of all types, ages and backgrounds. And so it was. Community members welcomed Kollel families. Torah was studied. Friendships were formed.



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20 Years of Nurturing the Flame Within

he Torah shared by Kollel scholars and their families is developed and nurtured during the Kollel's daily internal study sessions. During morning and afternoon sessions, Kollel scholars study Torah in-depth. Why are these study sessions so important to the success of the Kollel? In the words of Rosh Kollel (Dean) Rabbi Shachne Sommers (penned in Kollel Connection of Winter 2013):

The Talmud tells us that Rav Sheshes would review all of his Torah learning every thirty days. Following the review he would say to himself, "Rejoice, my soul, rejoice, my soul - for you I have learned." The Talmud then questions this statement: Is Torah learning merely beneficial to the soul of the learner?! The entire world benefits!

Answers the Talmud: It is true that Torah study benefits the entire world. Nevertheless, initially, when a person learns, he learns in order to benefit himself.

The true dynamo of Torah is the Torah that lives and burns within the person himself and then spreads outward. This is the expression of the true essence of Torah - the Torah of oneself.








































20 Years of Creating a Torah Environment

Chavrusah Connection Bruce Heitler

ountless Jews have studied Torah with the Kollel during the past twenty years. But how many of them can make the claim that they have studied with the Kollel for the past twenty years?

Bruce Heitler can. A successful real-estate developer and Denver native, Bruce and his wife, Dr. Susan Heitler, are devoted lifelong-learners, especially when it comes to Torah study. Bruce has studied Torah with Kollel Dean Rabbi Shachne Sommers for nearly twenty years.

"I was introduced to Rabbi Sommers by [Kollel Dean] Rabbi Aron Yehuda Schwab shortly after the Kollel was founded, about twenty years ago," recalls Bruce. "I invited [Rabbi Sommers] to attend a long-standing study group that met at our home."

Over the years, the group has studied a variety of Torah subjects, from Talmud-based studies of subjects like dreams, repentance and charity, to the *mussar* work *Orchos Tzadikim*; from sections of the Rambam's Mishneh Torah to the Ramban's commentary on the Torah, from the Alshich's commentary on Psalms to examining timely and relevant halachic dilemmas.

"Bruce devotes a huge amount of time to Torah study," asserts Rabbi Sommers, "both

in his office and at home. He is a brilliant man with a very wide range of knowledge on seemingly every conceivable subject. He is also an out-of-the-box thinker who has a unique perspective on many issues."

Those praises notwithstanding, Bruce humbly recognizes that for all he has studied, there is far more left to discover.

"I have been nourished by a long drink from the well of Torah, and I doubt if I have made much of a dent in the available water supply. I

am learning to aspire to the achievement of my maternal great-grandfather, about whom it was said that a day never passed when he did not speak words of Torah."

As is often the case, the Torah studied has led to personal relationships well beyond the four walls of the *bais medrash* (study hall).

"My family and I have become close friends with Bruce, his wife Susan and many of their children and grandchildren," says Rabbi Sommers. "We have also become close friends with many members of the study group over the years."

The very different backgrounds and perspectives from which Rabbi Sommers and Bruce come could well have impeded their ability to study together. But the opposite has occurred – it has been the impetus for growth in their Torah knowledge.

"Rabbi Sommers has been a model of Torahobservant Judaism, strong and vulnerable, flexible and strict, traditional and innovative," explains Bruce. "His knowledge of Jewish texts and tradition is encyclopedic. He is gentle, open, good-humored and encouraging. Yet, sometimes, he is strict, disciplined and urgent to reject assertions that are incompatible with the traditional point of view. He is generous and courageous about sharing personal stories

and advice that he has received from his own teachers."

"Bruce has great respect for Torah and the oral tradition of our Sages," says Rabbi Sommers. "Studying with Bruce and his group has given me the opportunity to articulate the Torah viewpoint on a wide variety of subjects to highly intelligent people. This experience has opened up new vistas of insight to me in many areas of Torah."
